Dear Mr. Kelder:

Your letter concerning your son, the late Private Arthur H. Kelder, has been received in this office.

It is with deep regret that you must be advised that up to the present time, information pertaining to the burial place of your son has not been received. In view of the fact that this information would have been compiled by the Japanese Government and transmitted through the International Red Cross, there is no assurance that it will be received unless it has already been furnished to the International Red Cross. However, you may be assured that the American Graves Registration Service is endeavoring to locate the graves of our deceased military personnel. This practice will continue until every effort to locate the graves has been exhausted.

At the present time this office cannot assure you that it will be possible to return the remains of your son, as it is not known if a report of burial will be received covering the interment of his remains. However, the War Department anticipates that, in the near future, authority will be granted to return at Government expense, the remains of those who died overseas to a final resting place as selected by the next of kin. Upon receipt of such authority, the War Department, through this office, will furnish full information to the proper next of kin and solicit their desires. It should be realized that this mission as a whole is world-wide in scope and of necessity time-consuming, but you may rest assured that this office fully appreciates your desires and well do everything in its power to fulfill them at the earliest possible date.

Please accept my sincere sympathy in the loss of your son.
